### **REV. MICHAEL'S NOTE**

Senior Pastor



Many people, including myself, looked forward to the end of 2020 because they were looking to put the difficulties of the year behind them. Even so, the end of 2020 brought many reasons to celebrate in the life of Dauphin Way that have nothing to do with what we are leaving behind and everything to do with what we are building towards.

Through all the ups and downs of a year unlike any other, we have been an exceedingly faithful church. We have faithfully worshipped God – whether we did so in-person or online — and our attendance numbers have shown remarkable steadiness in every season. We have welcomed new members. We have prayed faithfully for our church, our city, and our nation. We have generously shared in the mission of the church, and we enter 2021 as a debt-free congregation, set free for many opportunities

ahead of us. We might even say that the last real day of 2020 will be on January 31, 2021 when **Bishop David** Graves and Dr. Debora Bishop will join us for the burning of the note on our renovation loan.

I am convinced, and joyful, that 2021 will be a transformative year in all our lives, not least because of the ministry we share at Dauphin Way. As we turn our attention from "fixing" — fixing sound systems, roofs, video streaming and more — we can begin building.

This month's journal gives a glimpse of what we are building together for the kingdom of God. We begin by building each other up through faithful relationships, and I am excited to see the **new groups that will begin meeting on Sunday mornings, evenings, and weekdays**, starting on February 21st. Kat Brand and our children's ministry have built a **new Sunday night schedule for our kids' ministry**. And, much later in our year, we will build a new chapter in our ministry as we recognize **Rev. Kathy Jorgensen's "Jubilee"** — the 50th anniversary of her ministry at Dauphin Way — this summer. Kathy's report this month includes her announcement that, in July, she will move into a new, part-time role that focuses on our support groups, spiritual counseling, and pastoral care. Between now and then, she and our SPRC will be building a plan for how to hand over our outreach and community ministries to someone new who can continue building on Kathy's long and faithful ministry in these areas.

And, while we are building for the kingdom, we want to make it a little easier for anyone to enter the buildings where we worship each week. Our Church Council and program staff agreed that **we will no longer be requiring registration for our in-person worship services, beginning on February 21st.** We will still require registration for our Sunday morning children's activities, but we have arranged our worship seating in such a way what we don't have to worry about turning someone away if we have more than we expect on a given Sunday. We will still be wearing masks and keeping distance, but we are glad we can make things just a little bit easier. However, you join in the work of God at Dauphin Way this month, I am confident it will build your faith!



### TRADITIONAL WORSHIP- TREY WEST

Kat Brand, Beth Johnson, Colleen, and I met to discuss what the scheduling and flow of that programming will look like, and we're very excited about getting our kids back to weekly singing. Everyone will remain masked throughout our time together as we reach the goal of learning the songs of our faith in a fun, active environment.

As we recognize that COVID-19 is still very much a present threat, we are taking necessary precautions to ensure everyone's safety. ### SOCIETY OF ST. STEPHEN

When everything closed in March, the Society of St. Stephen thought it would be for a few weeks. We weren't able to work again until late August! Our clients were admitted singly, social distancing, and masks were required. We were down to working only one day, so we scheduled more appointments.

Although it was still summer, we began to worry about our Christmas project. How could we get members to shop for needy children? How could we possibly give a positive number to Catholic Social Services? We talked to them and promised to provide Christmas for 50 children-but how?! Kathy, our staff sponsor, saw that announcements were made whenever possible, and a plea was put in the "Along Dauphin Way." Kayla sent e-mails to everyone who shopped in 2019, and then to every church member. The response was overwhelming, and we called Catholic Social Services with a new promise to provide gifts for 94 children!!

Kayla helped by providing phone numbers for each volunteer shopper. Society of St. Stephen called each person to get their preference as to number to shop for, age, and boy or girl desired. We got the "Wish Lists" in early November, and once again, we called the shoppers (members of church, families, supper clubs, Sunday School classes, co-workers, Dauphin Way staff) to check addresses and let them know when the information letters would be mailed.

Reminder postcards were sent to each needy family as to when to pick up gifts. Our reserved church room was set up, and for two Sundays (8 A.M. – Noon), the gifts were received and made ready for pick-up. When the gifts were delivered by the shoppers, we, of course, were very appreciative. As we thanked them for using their money and time, they thanked us for letting them take part in this project.

On Wednesday and Thursday (12/16 and 12/17) the families picked up their child's gifts. This was a big effort when you saw numerous bikes, basketball goals, and doll houses, etc. Brittany gave of her time by helping us and getting some college students to also help. They were efficient and very helpful getting the gifts and taking them to the car. Again, this was done with one adult entering at a time, and staying at the door, of course, wearing a mask!

On Friday (12/18), we had a "Walk-in-Day" for those families not on any list. The room was transformed into a toyshop arranged by ages and boy/girl items. With only about six volunteers, 250 children were provided with 3-4 Christmas items. Which ones were blessed more-the children or our volunteers!

In spite of a difficult year, Society of St. Stephen was once again blessed by Dauphin Way.

Many memories stand out – one in particular. An 8-year-old girl wanted to make her own money and be able to shop. She had a hot cocoa, and cookie stand and shocked everyone by making \$700.00! She shared the money with us and several other organizations. When her family delivered their gifts, she was able to see what our church members had done.

Not only were we able to bless needy families, but we were blessed more than we can express. In a very "different" year, our church proved once again how capable we are, and that a problem can be solved even in a very difficult time. God is good, and when we put our faith in him ANYTHING is possible!! Happy New Year

At the end of a "much-shortened" year, the Society of St. Stephen had also helped 303 families with utility bills and/or food!

A few months ago, we offered a class on the book *Caste*. Frye Gaillard, Ruth, and Steve Dill led the class. The class was well-received on zoom with 60 people registered. I am sharing with you the newest zoom class offering from our Racial Justice and Reconciliation Committee.

The Racial Justice and Reconciliation Committee of Dauphin Way United Methodist Church will sponsor a threeweek class by University of South Alabama Writer in Residence Frye Gaillard on his award-winning book, *A Hard Rain: America in the 1960s, Our Decade of Hope, Possibility, and Innocence Lost.* The class will meet via Zoom each **Sunday at 5 p.m. on January 31, February 7, and February 14.** Gaillard will discuss the history of a turbulent and pivotal decade in American history and the lessons and warnings it may hold for today. A Hard Rain is available on Amazon and elsewhere. The advanced reading of the book is not required. NPR named A Hard Rain to be one of the Great Reads of 2018. The book won the Fitzgerald Museum Literary Prize and the Alabama Governor's Award for the Arts. Gaillard is a native of Mobile. **This class will be on Zoom. You can register on our Dauphin Way website.** 

At our most recent SPRC meeting, I shared that this summer will be my fiftieth year of ministry at Dauphin Way, and after a great deal of prayer, and after talking it over with my family and with Michael, I've decided that the summer would be good time to step back from some of my responsibilities in our outreach and community partnership ministries. 

She and I will lead our three training sessions and provide continued support to our groups and leaders throughout the year. Our goal is to create a sustainable Small Group ministry that will continue far into the future. We believe that by offering suggestions for curriculum, schedules, leadership instruction, and other helpful tips, our leaders will have the tools required to lead faithfully and not experience burnout along the way. In addition to the Small Groups, we will offer some of the subject material in a class format. During Lent, I will teach from the book *Entering the Passion of Jesus* by Amy Jill-Levine. This book is the same one that will guide our sermons throughout the season of Lent.

Over the coming months, we will also be adding other pieces back to our Adult Discipleship offerings. Beginning in March, we will start our Dauphin Way 101 class again. We will offer this three-week class each month, starting on the second Sunday of the month. We will also invite anyone who has participated in the study to join the church on the fourth Sunday of every month – these will be our "Membership Sundays." Throughout the year, we also plan on teaching subsequent courses in the Dauphin Way Education Series. These classes will be DW 201, 301, and 401. Each class will cover various aspects of our Christian beliefs and what unique things set us apart as United Methodists.

The new year is always a time full of possibility and excitement. I believe we have much to be grateful for and much for which we ought to be excited!

Generally meets in the second week of the month. The Board of Trustees is the only committee that elects its own chair. Anyone may attend a Trustees' meeting.

### FINANCE



Generally meets in the third week of the month. 13 voting members include Chair, Treasurer, Financial Secretary, Lay Leader, SPRC Chair, and Trustees Chair. Anyone may attend a Finance meeting.

## NOMINATIONS

The Nominations Committee meets three times in August and September to prayerfully consider who to nominate as officers and committee members for Dauphin Way's leadership. The committee seeks input from all volunteer teams and also considers which members have been actively living their commitments to prayer, presence, gifts, service, and witness. Because these meetings deal with individual members of the congregation, they are strictly confidential.

### **ADMINISTRATIVE UPDATES**

#### STAFF-PARISH RELATIONS

The meeting examined the 2020 financials and was excited by the positive results, particularly the payment in full of the church debt. In our annual consultation with our District Superintendent, we shared our preference to have both of our appointed pastors — Rev. Precht and Dr. Lisenby — reappointed to Dauphin Way for 2021-2022. Rev. Jorgensen shared her plans to move to part-time work status, effective July 1. Each of Rev. Precht, Lisenby, and Jorgensen shared expectations for 2021 and that they are excited about how things are going.

#### TRUSTEES

The Trustees meetings will be the second Tuesday of the month, except when they meet on December 7th. Nations Roof has completed repairing the roof, and final payment is en-route. Michael is excited about getting ahead of the 2020 year and looking forward to the year to come.

#### FINANCE

Our December giving was above budget. Giving totaled \$2,320,389.37 resulting, in a net surplus of over \$113,582.39. This balance included paying off the loan debt. Non-pledged giving is up over last year's total. Overall, we remain in strong financial shape. Cindy received in December a statement that the church's insurance would be increasing \$18,000 a year. The increase has caused the 2021 budget to be negative \$17,371.00. The CDC had a positive inflow during December of over \$3,472.02. They made a payment of \$5,000 to cover their fiscal year 17-18 audit. The CDC was able to make all rent payments to the church for the year. Cindy is waiting to hear back from Hancock Whitney from the PPP application. We feel good moving forward. Michael discussed that in February and March, church members can get involved in small groups. The groups will help members get plugged into church activities.


