We have had a great beginning to the Great Fifty Days, the season that stretches from the first day of Easter to the day of Pentecost. As much as I was personally moved and awed by spending six weeks of worship, devotion, and study with our attention fixed on The Cross - my joy was even greater as we gathered on Easter Sunday to visit the empty tomb together.

For all that we have done and seen in the last month, I am also aware of a few things that remain undone. Between confirmation interviews, holidays, and new job listings, we are still trying to find time to convene our nominations committee to name a "Process Team" to help Dauphin Way navigate upcoming changes in our denomination. I hope that next month's report will include news of progress on that front.

The rest of these Great Fifty Days go from grace to grace as we celebrate Confirmation Sunday, Mother's Day, and Senior Sunday while we also spend 7 weeks

in the book of First Corinthians, where we will learn from the church's concerns and Paul's teachings about the role of the dining table in the fellowship of the Church. The Corinthians believed that what we eat, and when, and with whom are the sorts of questions that reveal and shape our fellowship with God, and Dauphin Way - of all churches - knows that the Corinthians were right! One of my favorite lines from Dauphin Way's history came from the old building superintendent Hayes Brinkley, who once said "Dauphin Way Methodists are the eating-est folks I've ever seen!" For many years, our receptions, dinners, and supper clubs have fed the soul as much as the body, and in the Great Fifty Days of Easter, our vision is that God will add 50 new members to our church and 50 new tables to at least five new supper clubs that we will launch in June.

One way we are making that vision possible is by offering our first-ever *Dauphin Way 101 Fast Track*. Typically, Dauphin Way 101 takes place over four weeks each month, but on May 15 all are welcome to join us for dinner in McGowin Hall as Woods, Kathy and I offer the whole of Dauphin Way 101 in a 90 minute presentation.

Among our new job listings that I mentioned above, the most vital and intricate is our search for a new Director of Traditional Worship and Music. I am so very grateful to Trey West for these 4 years in which he has shared his tremendous talents with us and shaped the worship of Dauphin Way in ways that will endure far into the future. I pray every blessing on him and Becca as they prepare to return to the Fort Worth area. I am also grateful that John Ricketts has agreed to serve as our Interim Traditional Worship and Music Director while our SPRC works with two consultants — James Seay of First United Methodist Church in Montgomery, AL, and Will Young of First Presbyterian Church in Charlotte, NC — who are guiding our search process. At this moment, we have 5 applicants whose experience and education meet our requirements for the position. By the end of May, our search committee will conduct initial interviews before deciding who to invite for a full interview and rehearsal with our choir and the SPRC. The search committee includes two members of our SPRC (Tom Clement and Don Foose), two members of the choir (Alan Farmer and Gloria King), and two regular attendees of the traditional worship services (Tracey Lane and Shannon Phillips).

Finally, I owe a tremendous debt of thanks to Lynn Davidson for all she has done to coordinate this year's confirmation experience, to Shannon Rhodes for organizing this year's Confirmation Breakfast, and to all our confirmation mentors. It is one of my greatest joys in ministry to sit with our confirmands each year for their Spiritual Direction Interviews, and then to stand before them as they profess their faith in the presence of their church. Those highlight moments are made possible by hundreds of hours of behind-the-scenes moments of personal conversations and schedule coordination. I owe more than I can say to everyone who has ministered to our 18 confirmands this year, preparing the way for them to be the first of the fifty new members that God will send us in these Great 50 Days!

PROGRAM REPORTS CHILDREN'S MINISTRY- KAT BRAND



Last month, we celebrated the wonderful story of Jesus' resurrection. The children have spent weeks journeying to the cross. We have learned about Palm Sunday, The Last Supper, the Garden of Gethsemane, Pontius Pilate, the road to Golgotha, the death of Jesus, and the Resurrection and empty tomb. It is amazing to witness children visit and revisit this story every year. We've heard it so many times, yet each year we see the story with new eyes, hear it with new ears, and experience it in our souls with a renewed spirit. The Holy Spirit opens up so many new emotions. This year, the 4th and 5th graders had so many questions about Judas. Who was he? What was he like? Why would he betray Jesus? What could he have been thinking? What could have motivated him? They wanted a full character/personality profile of Judas. I love to see them dig deep into parts of the story and really start to process the people, places, and events. They start to put themselves in the story and ask deep questions. I always challenge them to hear the story, to really listen.

Then we start to think through what the people in the story could have been feeling and thinking. What did this event mean for the people in the story? Then we read it again and start to ask, what does this mean for us? Can you see yourself in this story? Who can you relate to? What do you think you would have done or been feeling? Suddenly a story that you have heard so many times starts to have new meaning. Something that you've nearly memorized because you've heard it so many times starts to crack open with new life. I love to see their minds work and their hearts open up as they experience scripture and feel it come to life.

Looking forward, we are gearing up for Vacation Bible School! Most, if not all, of our time will be devoted to VBS. I absolutely love VBS! It requires gargantuan amounts of time, energy, resources, and volunteers. But it is incredible to see the building transform and the rooms and hallways overflowing with children. There is so much excitement and energy. It's so awesome to see our children invite friends to join them at church. It's an amazing way to encourage them on their path of discipleship! We can't wait to see everyone Under the Big Top!

This month my heartfelt gratitude goes to our incredible nursery staff! We have the most amazing and dedicated staff that love and care for our children every week. We learned that using our different senses as a tool in worship experiences was both powerful and memorable. These hands-on worship experiences are moments that will stick with our students for the rest of their lives.

The week following our worship night was Palm Sunday and Easter on the Lawn. Kat did an incredible job coordinating the kids for Palm Sunday and all the fun activities at Easter on the Lawn. I was proud to see our youth happily jumping in to help with the kids, waving palms and serving as volunteers at children's church. At Easter on the Lawn, we had a big crew of youth come to the patch and help at our food booth to raise money for

the upcoming high school mission trip to Puerto Rico. In the two hours we served hot dog meals and goodies, we made \$341! This past week, registration closed for the Puerto Rico mission trip and the Orlando Retreat. We are thrilled that there will be fifty-six of us attending the Orlando Retreat this June and twenty of us serving in Puerto Rico this July. This month in specific, it has been amazing to see our students live out their call as disciples through their prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness.

This Saturday, April 23rd, our students have another opportunity to serve in a food distribution day with Dwell Mobile. The following week on April 29th, we have a mission trip fundraiser called Parents' Night Out for all our parents with little ones. Sunday, May 1st, is Confirmation Sunday, when we will celebrate eighteen sixth graders make commitments to a lifelong faith journey. At our final SNL that same day, we will have an ice cream party to welcome our sixth graders officially to the student ministry! A couple weeks later on Sunday, May 15th, is Senior Sunday! The past month has been a fun time of connecting with new members and making new friends! At the end of March, we hosted our first New Member Dinner of the year. In addition to volunteering time, Dauphin Way members donated money to ensure that children who could not afford to buy a book did not walk away empty-handed. Our partnership with Leinkauf did not stop there. We also now have 10 tutors from Dauphin Way serving 35 students in the 1st and 3rd grades. Each Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, you can find our servant volunteers helping children learn the alphabet and how to read. A few of the tutors also assist in math. After having our Backpack Ministry put on hold at Leinkauf (due to a generous grant the school received), I am so pleased that we have been able to minister to the children in another way.

Looking forward, I am excited for our Dauphin Way 101 Dinner that will take place on May 15th. This will be an intensive Dauphin Way 101 class for those families who are interested in receiving the 3 sessions of material all at once. The class will last 1.5 hours, dinner will be served, and childcare will be provided. If you or someone you know is interested in learning more about Dauphin Way UMC, please let me know!

So during the weeks of Lent, we were called to practice the disciplines—self-examination and repentance, prayer and fasting, sacrificial giving and works of love — strengthened by the gifts of word and sacrament. This month, our widows in Guided by Grace enjoyed an outing to the Cornerstone Gardens and Arboretum on Government St. The garden was created as a place of meditation, rest and reflection for Carriage House Repose & Restore, Inc., a Christian support ministry for ministers, missionaries and evangelists. The Carriage House is situated on the property close to the gardens, and the pastors and others come to stay there as a short-term respite. The caretakers and stewards of the Carriage House ministry have opened the gardens to the general public so as to share the natural beauty and wonder of over 5,000 plants and trees comprised of over 150 different species. We were very appreciative to Mr. Drinkard for giving us a tour of the gardens. After the garden tour our group returned to the church for a delicious supper and a time to visit. We look at this support group, under the devoted leadership of Lynn Stewart, as an oasis in their grief.

This month we had two funerals in our church, our long-time member Jack Smith passed away. On good Friday we had the graveside service of Glo Oxford, the niece of Glo and Bill Welsh. Our hospital visits have picked up also, now as hospitals are easing up on their visitation guidelines. It is good to be able to visit and pray with those hospitalized. This month we also held the memorial service for Dr. Stephen Dill. It was a service fitting for a great man of the ministry and community service. We celebrated his outstanding life, as well as the 19 years he guided the Dauphin Way congregation as senior pastor. We appreciated the choir for their music during the service and for Sara Jane Fulmer heading up the bereavement team, who provided hospitality during the memorial service and the meal for the family and guests. Sara Jane and her committee always do a lovingly beautiful job and we so appreciate their tender care of our grieving families.

Each morning during Holy Week was a blessing filled with incredible worship, food, and fellowship. Our Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services were spectacular and left us feeling the weight of Christ's Passion, propelling our congregation into an unforgettable day of worship on Easter Sunday! Preceding all of our Holy Week joys was by a beautiful Palm Sunday where we watched the children parade with the palms, and together we celebrated Easter on the Lawn hosted by Kat Brand and the children's ministry. Lent and Holy Week could not have gone better, and I am grateful to all our staff and volunteers who put in hours of work to make it so memorable!

To top off a reflection on this past Lenten season, I must say that I am overwhelmed by the generosity of our congregation in supporting our collection for RIP Medical Debt. At the beginning of Lent, we ask the congregation to make a Lenten sacrifice that would be something of financial value (a cup of coffee, a meal, a streaming platform, etc.) and then bring the savings from those sacrifices as part of a congregational collection. Our goal was to raise \$10,000, which, thanks to the work of RIP Medical Debt, would cancel out over \$1,000,000 worth of medical debt. I am floored that this congregation exceeded our goal and raised over \$19,039 which means we are able will help forgive over \$1,900,000 of debt! That is what a tangible expression of Christ's forgiveness, grace, and generosity looks like, and it is something we should all celebrate!

As we turn our attention to May, I look forward to all the things we get to celebrate over the coming weeks. This late-spring season is our time to celebrate our confirmands, our seniors, and all those who act as mothers in our lives. Each Sunday this month is full of joy, and we plan our worship services so that our congregation can show love and support to all of these persons. We hope you will join us throughout Eastertide as we journey through the book of 1 Corinthians and consider more what it means to be a church that endeavors to resemble God's kingdom. As a part of our series "Food for Thought," you will hear more about our 50 Members and 50 Tables initiative. - Anyone may attend a Church Council meeting.
- Voting members include the pastors, 12 officers, and 9-12 at-large members.

SPRC

The Staff-Parish Relations Committee generally meets in the second week of the month. Because the SPR deals with sensitive, employment-related issues, their meetings are usually open only to members. However, the SPRC chair may invite non-members to attend a particular meeting.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Generally meets in the second week of the month. The Board of Trustees is the only committee that elects its own chair.

Anyone may attend a Trustees' meeting.

FINANCE

Generally meets in the third week of the month.

13 voting members include Chair, Treasurer, Financial Secretary, Lay Leader, SPRC Chair, and Trustees Chair. Anyone may attend a Finance meeting.

NOMINATIONS

The Nominations Committee meets three times in August and September to prayerfully consider who to nominate as officers and committee members for Dauphin Way's leadership. The committee seeks input from all volunteer teams and also considers which members have been actively living their commitments to prayer, presence, gifts, service, and witness. Because these meetings deal with individual members of the congregation, they are strictly confidential.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORTS

STAFF-PARISH RELATIONS

Following Trey's announcement that he has taken a job in Texas, the Music and Worship Director position announcement was posted publicly. A search committee was named and includes SPRC members, choir members, and traditional worship attendees with young and teen aged children. John Ricketts has agreed to fill in as Music and Worship Director until a permanent director is hired. It was announced that the DWUMC wedding director position has been filled by Wanda Coleman. Additionally, Duke Divinity student, Beth Johnson, has accepted a summer internship with us.

SPRC addressed admin and maintenance staff shortages since both departments are currently seeking to fill open positions. Preliminary plans for a staff appreciation event in October were presented by the staff appreciation subcommittee. Finally, in an effort to improve how future positions are created and how staff is hired, Woods led an exercise to help SPRC begin to imagine an ideal version of DWUMC's staff.

TRUSTEES

Dauphin Way had a very good March, ending the month with a net surplus of \$28,827.73. This almost completely eliminated the year-to-date deficit, which is now only \$6,686.75.

We are working with all parties involved to get the mold remediation in the chapel resolved as quickly as possible. Things have been delayed due to supply chain issues.

We have accepted L'Arche's offer to purchase 28 & 30 Lee Street for \$225,000. At their inspection of the property, they learned that there is a potential termite and water damage problem. We have extended the closing date to allow L'Arche time to figure out how much it is going to cost to fix everything. They have not rescinded their offer.
