## FROM THE SENIOR PASTOR

God has been good to Dauphin Way in 2023. Evening activities are in full swing, welcoming just as many

people as they did last fall. Worship has been full of grace and beauty in all our services, and our Trust/Worthy sermon series seems to have hit home; Woods and I have both received an unusual number of responses to that series, thanking us for addressing some of the doubts and questions that most affect their faith. Personally, the year started off differently than most; I've spent a little more time out of the office than I'm accustomed to – first with back trouble, and then with an infection, and then for some time researching and writing our In Good Faith study for Lent. I thank God for the joy of serving a church that keeps on keeping on, even on days when I couldn't. We even had a great start to our finances; this is the first time anyone can remember that we've begun the year without a deficit, even after paying all our insurance and other start-of-the year expenses. We've also welcomed several new members, one of whom is an old member! Roughly two years ago, Jo Blount moved away from Mobile and transferred her membership from Dauphin Way. This last month, Jo – who has used Zoom to continue as a weekly participant in her Sunday school class and her Wednesday prayer group, while worshipping online - asked if she could re-join Dauphin Way. We were honored to welcome her, and her initiative sparked a conversation in our staff meeting about how we can facilitate online membership for those who may want to pursue a similar option.

Jo's reconnection to Dauphin Way has me thinking about mission fields; they're all around us – in our neighborhoods, on ballfields, in classrooms, and campuses and offices. In this digital age, we have mission fields in other cities. Everywhere we go, we are missionaries. Several months ago, our process team at Dauphin Way introduced a prayer that we will include in all our worship during the season of Lent "Lord, set us apart from worldly decision-making by how we love one another." I have cherished that prayer, and I have now prayed it to God hundreds of times because I believe God's grace is able to accomplish that prayer in ways that go beyond all we might ask or imagine. I am grateful for the reminder that missions are not a program or an event — a missional life is one in which everything, even our decision-making, becomes a sign of the Kingdom in the midst of a desperate world.

My mind boggles when I think of all the ways and all the places Dauphin Way sends missionaries. We send them to Facebook and Instagram and TikTok; we send them to our neighborhoods; we send them to Meals on Wheels routes, and we send them to parent-teacher conferences and community centers and hunting camps and restaurants. We send missionaries to all these places because you spend time in all these places and more. As you read through this month's journal and get caught up on everything we're doing *at* Dauphin Way, remember that this is only a fraction of what God is doing *through* Dauphin Way. And then, take a moment to try and number all the mission fields that God has given *you*; every mission makes a difference.

# CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

Children's Ministry has had various wins in 2023; the first night of programming in 2023 averaged 60 kids, ranging from k4 to 5th grade, and our first big event of the year, Winter Retreat, was a huge success. Our volunteers and parents have been so supportive of the Ministry thus far. Children's Ministry at Dauphin Way is growing and thriving in fellowship. Furthermore, I would like to highlight details involving Winter Retreat, 3rd Grade Lock-in, VBS, and a few of our star volunteers from February.

I want to shine a little light on the 2023 Winter Retreat. 3rd, 4th, and 5th grade embarked on a journey to Blue Lake for Winter Retreat. The students spent time in fellowship with each other and 270 other kids. Between dancing in worship and playing intense Gaga Ball, the kids learned how to seek Jesus and how he finds us in our quest for Him. We learned how to participate in popcorn prayer, listen to God in nature, and look for him in this world around us. One verse guided the weekend's message, "You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart." Jeremiah 29:13. Overall, Winter Retreat 2023 was full of Jesus, love, and happiness.

# CONGREGATION CARE

"One of the main tasks of theology is to find words that do not divide but unite, that do not create conflict but unity, that do not hurt but heal". Henri Nouwen

In the work of membership care and all of compassion ministry, words are so important. I just preached at Toulminville Warren Street UMC on Valentine Sunday and the theme of the sermon was "What's Love Got to Do with It?" The answer is ...everything. It is said if we were to sum up the teachings of Christ in one word it would be LOVE. There is the wonderful story of the great theologian Karl Barth: Karl Barth was at Rockefeller Chapel (really a Gothic cathedral!) on the campus of the University of Chicago during his lecture tour of the U.S. in 1962. After his lecture, during the Q & A time, a student asked Barth if he could summarize his whole life's work in theology in a sentence. Barth said, "Yes, I can. In the words of a song I learned at my mother's knee: 'Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so."

With all of this in mind I would say that our Dauphin Way support groups and compassion ministries share God's love. You see it as the support group members receive unconditional love from the leaders and each participant. I would say that every time a Shepherd checks in on their homebound member, that church member feels loved. I would also believe that each time someone is prayed for on the prayer chain, led so well by Lorraine Zerfas, they feel loved and supported. Every time a hospital patient is prayed with or someone is wrapped in a prayer shawl, lovingly made for them and prayed for specially for them...love is felt. It is so important that in all we say and do, we express love through our words and actions. After all we are not only representing the United Methodist Church, and more specifically, Dauphin Way UMC, but need to be aware that we are representing God's love.

#### TRUSTEES

The church ended January with a small surplus for the first time (for a January) in a very long time. Great news!

The capital fund balance as of 1/31/2023 is \$265,625.43. This number is expected to be reduced to \$245,022.58 as we finish all of the projects that have been approved and are ongoing.

Repair to the pastors' suite is now complete and painting is almost done.

We are working on repairing water issues that persist in the sections of the basement that we have not yet remediated. It will save money to do the remaining work all at once instead of piecemeal.

Work is now done on the landscaping that was damaged when several problematic trees were removed from our campus. Doing it now ensures that everything will look nice in time for this summer's ordination.

We anticipate costly repairs/replacement to our chillers and cooling towers in the short term. Now may be the time to consider a capital campaign relating to this necessary work.

The Staff-Parish Relations Committee generally meets in the second week of the month. Because the SPR deals with sensitive, employment-related issues, their meetings are usually open only to members. However, the SPRC chair may invite non-members to attend a particular meeting.



Generally meets in the second week of the month. The Board of Trustees is the only committee that elects its own chair. Anyone may attend a Trustees' meeting.

### FINANCE



Generally meets in the third week of the month. 13 voting members include Chair, Treasurer, Financial Secretary, Lay Leader, SPRC Chair, and Trustees Chair. Anyone may attend a Finance meeting.

The Nominations Committee meets three times in August and September to prayerfully consider who to nominate as officers and committee members for Dauphin Way's leadership. The committee seeks input from all volunteer teams and also considers which members have been actively living their commitments to prayer, presence, gifts, service, and witness. Because these meetings deal with individual members of the congregation, they are strictly confidential.
