FROM THE SENIOR PASTOR

Thanksgiving brought the end of a whirlwind fall season at Dauphin Way. Whether we were gathering to hear from Amy Jill Levine for our annual Dill Lecture, or talking about deep things in our Home Meetings, or taking over the South Alabama rec center for the Youth Lock-in, or launching new children's choirs, or teaching the story of the Exodus during M&M, we have been about making disciples in every way we could think of. In worship, we have heard how Jesus addresses the worries we all share in the Sermon on the Mount; we have learned from the prayerful example of Abraham, Thomas Merton, Susannah Wesley, and Rhoda in the book of Acts. It has been a rich season.

It has also been a weighty season. On November 27, 2023, Dauphin Way's Church Council met to consider the Discernment Team's proposal for a "Statement of Principle," which was shared with the congregation on one month ago for prayer and comment.

The meeting was well attended, with 22 of the 24 council members present and a large number of church members in attendance to observe and offer comment. After a time for comments — open to all church members — the Council moved into a formal business session in which amendments were proposed and the particulars of the statement were discussed.

Having had a month to pray over and discuss the proposed Statement of Principle, many people were not yet satisfied that it fully conveys who we are, and who God is calling us to be. That is as it should be; that is exactly why our Process Team set aside this time for prayer and deliberation.

In the end, the Council voted unanimously against adopting *any* statement on behalf of Dauphin Way.

With that vote, Dauphin Way's formal time of discernment is ended, and there are no proposals before the Church Council regarding our denominational future. Future meetings of the Church Council may choose to revisit the work of our Discernment Process after the United Methodist General Conference in May, or for some other reason. Any proposals to form a new Discernment Team or engage the congregation in another discernment process would require a motion from a member of the Church Council, followed by a majority vote of the Council.

Someone asked if that means we are still "waiting," which is a good question to ask in the season of Advent. We are always "waiting," in that every single person, every single day, is waiting to see what tomorrow will bring. Our Church Council will always be waiting to see if there are new opportunities and new challenges we need to address so that Dauphin Way can "make disciples who make a difference."

But as a church, we are no longer waiting for any reports or recommendations, and we are not waiting to find out "who we are." We will be who we already are. We are each other.

We are the community of faith planted by God in the heart of Mobile to proclaim the Gospel in word and deed, to bring good news to new generations, to new neighbors, and to anyone who is hungry for grace. We are the folks who have dedicated our lives to *making disciples who make a difference*, and we are not waiting to do so.

I want to close with a word of deep appreciation for Brittany Dang, as she departs Dauphin Way on December 3 to take her new position at Lake Forest Church in North Carolina.

In her time as our Student Ministry Director, Brittany has been a faithful witness in every way - she has personally invested in our students, while also equipping our adult leaders to do the same. She has created a culture of disciples who make disciples, and that I have all the confidence in the world that Andrew Peeler will build on and continue to grow her good work. She has been a true and faithful Christ-bearer among us. She is an incredibly effective leader, and I am praying with great joy for her as she makes her move.

Thank you, friend; we are so grateful.

John Wesley considered singing such an important communal act of piety that he left behind detailed instructions on how his followers should sing that can still be found in the front pages of the United Methodist Hymnal today. With a long history we all look to the exciting future that is before us.

I am eagerly anticipating being a part of my first White Christmas event as Director of Music and Worship. Many hours of preparation and planning go into this traditional service of Lessons and Carols



telling the story of Advent and Christmas. For over eighty years, this much anticipated event has featured all of the ensembles of the church joined by members of the Mobile Symphony Orchestra. This is an especially important evening for the whole church and community, not only for it's legacy and grandeur, but also for its purpose as we come together to give a special offering to Embrace Alabama Kids Foundation, supporting a ministry that enriches the lives of those who need it most. Mark your calendars and plan to attend this year's White Christmas event on Sunday evening December 17 at 5:30PM.

Choirs have been integral to Christian worship for centuries, and their importance cannot be overstated. STUDENT MINISTRY

We have wrapped up our final SNL of the fall with a night of worship on gratitude. I can't think of a better way to end my time at Sow New Life than being in a room with students lifting our voices to the Lord and sitting with God at various prayer stations on gratitude. We worshipped through song, journaling, meditating on Psalms, walking the prayer labyrinth in Moore Hall, sitting in silence at the cross, and lifting up prayers for both our neighbors and our world. The Holy Spirit's presence was evidently felt throughout the evening. I am overwhelmed with gratitude to the Lord to have been the one entrusted to shepherd these students the past three and a half years.

Just a few weeks ago we finished up Dauphin Way's twenty-fifth pumpkin patch season. Our revenue was \$34,354.68. Our net profit was \$16,442.45. Since we made just over \$30,000 in pumpkin sales, we were able to keep the maximum percentage (forty percent). The other \$4,434.30 came from the market, bake sale, hayrides, field trips, and donations. This season in particular garnered more media attention than ever. We were invited to Fox10's Studio 10 for a segment on Market in the Patch, and then NBC 15 visited us on Halloween night to do a segment. Overall, it has been another successful pumpkin season financially. Thank you to all who supported us this season, especially our shift volunteers!

Coming up on December 3rd is our annual youth Christmas party. SALT (our student leadership team) picked the theme this year, and it is everything but



Christmas! We are excited to creatively celebrate the end of the year together. We will also be taking up food donations for the Society of St. Stephen at the party. The following Saturday, the youth is going Christmas shopping for our four Angel Tree children we have adopted through Society of St. Stephen again this year. Monday, December 11th, is the deadline to sign up for Winter Retreat this year. We will be going back to the Alabama 4-H Center on MLK weekend, January 12-15, 2024. We already have twenty-four students signed up in the first week of registration. Please reach out to Andrew Peeler for more information about how to sign up or sponsor a student.

The past month of transition has been bittersweet. While it is hard to let go, I could not be more confident in Andrew and the wonderful leaders and parents behind him to shepherd our youth. As of this month, Andrew is now the acting interim youth director and will continue to do an excellent job.

Thank you, church family, for your prayers, words of encouragement, support, and love. I will treasure it all. May the Lord continue to work and move in the lives of every person at Dauphin Way.

My favorite time of the weekend was when we worshiped together in the beautiful Lambuth Chapel, a gorgeous 19th-century white chapel with no power, no water, and the purest acoustics you could ever hope to sing in. As the sun set, we worshiped, prayed, remembered the saints, shared in Holy Communion, and heard the word of God proclaimed. All the while, my daughter Ellie was scribbling furiously with crayons, August Lisenby was passed out on her mother, and all the kids were captivated by the armadillo walking across the grass outside the window during the sermon. It was a beautiful snapshot of our church family seeking God together in the same sacred space but each in our way. I am thankful for Brianna Lisenby, Anna Parks, and Sutton Tremayne for making Family Camp happen.

I also celebrate the work in our Children's, Youth, and Adult Ministries. Our Children's Choirs and Chimes and Bells led by Reagan Lord and Colleen Hicks shared the gift of song with our congregation on multiple occasions, filling the room with their joyful noise. Leading the Cherub Choir is always one of the highlights of my week, and I was so proud of them when they sang, "Lord, prepare me to be a sanctuary" with such spirit. Our interim Children's Ministry Assistant Sutton Tremayne, our nursery staff, and our volunteers continue to do great ministry with our kids, teaching them about the story of Joshua and how God helps us to be brave when we are afraid. I speak for Joyce Sockwell, who leads this ministry, in offering a big "THANK YOU" to our whole church for this amazing accomplishment which will help put food on the table for people in need. Dauphin Way is also blessing Inner City Mission with Thanksgiving Turkeys, and we ensured that the parents of

children on the Angel Tree will be able to give their kids Christmas presents. Thank you for your generosity and service, Dauphin Way!

We're not done yet, though! Our Children's Christmas Party on December 10 will be titled "First Gift Party" as they continue the tradition of making cards and ornaments for those who are homebound. I will need some volunteers to sign up and deliver the gift bags, so be on the lookout for a signup sheet for that. We are also in the process of reviving Dauphin Way's repair ministry, Jacob's Ladder, which will perform repairs at a minimal cost for people in need. Lastly, we are also praying about partnering with one of the new church plants in Tanzania through Wesley College, and we may even send a team over there in the near future. Dr. Woods Lisenby

I lived in Panama City Beach for several summers in college and worked at a Methodist retreat center called Noah's Ark. The Ark was a large part of my Christian formation in middle and high school. Those of us college students on summer staff would serve with the youth groups staying on-site, clean the facilities every day, and play music as members of the band 2x2 each evening. Countless people cycled through over the years, and 2x2 is now like a big extended family. Members from the 70's and 80's are as much 2x2 as those of us in the 2000s. And every summer, former 2x2 members would travel down to PCB, visit The Ark, and typically sit in with the band at night. One such instance I will never forget was when Kyle Domangue came through in the summer of 2008. Kyle was in the band during the late 80's early 90's and was from Louisianna. He brought his daughter Bethany for vacation not long after his wife passed away from a hard battle with cancer. He came for the afternoon rehearsal, and one of the other band members, who knew Kyle better than I did, asked him if we could play a new song Kyle had written. The song was called "Thankful." Kyle pulled out his guitar, sat on a stool, and played it for us so we could all hear how it went. I'll never forget the first time I heard the song.

The first verse and chorus go like this:

When I look around and I see All the bad that can happen to me I'm just thankful for the good things in my life

Many broken hearts, many shattered dreams Things aren't what they seem to be I'm just thankful that I had someplace to turn

Well, I can be a prisoner who was chained for doing wrong



But I lived the good life with the chance to live long I only wanna say that I'm thankful for today Because when the time has come to meet you, Lord I want you to know I believe your word

I'm just thankful (thankful) For my life and the people I Love I'm just thankful (thankful) I look forward to heaven above I'm just thankful (thankful) For my life that was meant to be Lord, I thank you for the chance to be me.

There was a man who lost his wife—a widower of an elementary school-aged child. This man had experienced the pain of one of the hardest losses and was singing about the things for which he was thankful.

I think about that song every Thanksgiving. Actually, I think about that song all the time. But it is especially important for me this year. As we move into this holiday season, I feel the pull of scarcity mindset than usual. When I let my mind wade in the waters of scarcity, I become more resentful and critical about what I/we lack. If only we had more money, more staff, more buy-in, But then I remember Kyle. A man who lost the love of his life and could still sing about the things for which he was thankful. A man in lament could still thank God for all he had. And I am reminded that the things that are eternal will last, and the temporal will pass away. Anything that matters which is lost is never lost to God. Our loved ones, our efforts, and our own lives will ring out in eternity, even as the things of this world fade.

I pray in this season of year-end budgeting and decision-making that thankfulness and gratitude will guide our every thought. I pray that we will live not in a scarcity mentality but one that sees God's abundance and rejoices about all we have received. I hope you will join me in looking at all Dauphin Way has already been given and give thanks!

LEADERSHIP @ DAUPHIN WAY

CHURCH COUNCIL

- Generally meets on the fourth Monday of the month.
- Anyone may attend a Church Council meeting.
- Voting members include the pastors, 12 officers, and 9-12 at-large members.

SPRC

The Staff-Parish Relations Committee generally meets in the second week of the month. Because the SPR deals with sensitive, employment-related issues, their meetings are usually open only to members. However, the SPRC chair may invite non-members to attend a particular meeting.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Generally meets in the second week of the month. The Board of Trustees is the only committee that elects its own chair. Anyone may attend a Trustees' meeting.

FINANCE

Generally meets in the third week of the month.

13 voting members include Chair, Treasurer, Financial Secretary, Lay Leader, SPRC Chair, and Trustees Chair. Anyone may attend a Finance meeting.

NOMINATIONS

The Nominations Committee meets three times in August and September to prayerfully consider who to nominate as officers and committee members for Dauphin Way's leadership. The committee seeks input from all volunteer teams and also considers which members have been actively living their commitments to prayer, presence, gifts, service, and witness. Because these meetings deal with individual members of the congregation, they are strictly confidential.

LEADERSHIP REPORTS

STAFF-PARISH RELATIONS

The SPRC met on November 9, 2023. It was a productive meeting and the committee's task forces have been busy.

Most importantly and excitingly, we are thrilled to announce the hiring of our new Director of Children's Ministries, Rachel Broughton. You may remember that the SPRC had previously interviewed Rachel and offered her this same position one year ago, when she had to turn it down for family reasons. We are thrilled that Rachel's situation has changed such that she was able to reapply, and our search committee was blown away all over again by her heart, her vision, and her experience. Rachel comes to us with more than a decade of experience as Christian educator, most recently as Director of Children's Ministries at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Chattanooga, TN.

One task force completed an initiative to recognize staff members on their birthdays and express our gratitude for their hard work. Another task force is in the final stages of completing an exit interview form to be used when staff members leave Dauphin Way. The SPRC conducted an inperson interview with a Contemporary Worship Leader candidate and will be reviewing several more candidates.

TRUSTEES

The church ended October with a profit of \$22,528.95. This profit reduced the year-to-date deficit to \$153,691.72. Hopefully things will continue in this positive direction through the remainder of 2023.

The capital fund balance as of 10/31/2023 is \$285,513.63. This number is expected to be reduced to \$181,618.58 as we finish all of the projects that have been approved and are ongoing.

This month, we discussed how we wanted to handle several issues relating to the new pastors' suite a/c unit, remediating damage caused by leaking windows in the chapel, the lightning strike-related insurance claim, necessary AED training, and amending the facilities use agreement to permit our community to use our basketball court.

FINANCE

The Finance Committee met on November 14th to review the October financial reports and continue the budgeting process. The month ended with a profit of \$23,000, which brings our year-to-date to a loss of \$154,000. The CDC ended the month with a profit of \$30,000, bringing year-to-date to a profit of \$75,000. Prior year giving trends for the final quarter were reviewed and based on this data, we expect to meet our 2023 projected budget for total receipts in the final two months of the year.

A draft of the 2024 budget was reviewed for each department and will be finalized during our next meeting on December 5th. We will have a better idea of expected receipts for 2024 for planning purposes once pledge cards are received on Commitment Sunday.
