Abraham Heschel in his wonderful book on Sabbath says, "Last in creation, first in intention, the Sabbath is 'the end of creation of heaven and earth." In other words, Sabbath was not created just to renew us so that we can work more efficiently in the week ahead. It isn't the tool to get us to the destination. It is the destination.

So, if we are treating Sabbath like another box to check then we are missing the mark. Sabbath is a gift and a glimpse of the heavenly kingdom to come. Heschel also says, "Unless one learns how to relish the taste of Sabbath while still in this world, unless one is initiated in the appreciation of eternal life, one will be unable to enjoy the taste of eternity in the world to come. Sad is the lot of him who arrives inexperienced and when led to heaven has no power to perceive the beauty of Sabbath...The essence of the world to come is Sabbath eternal, and the seventh day in time is an example of eternity. The Seventh day...was given as a foretaste of the world to come."

So, this week and every week, stop. Take a break from the busyness of life so that you can experience the fullness of life. I hope to see you in worship on Sunday so that we can enjoy that Sabbath rest together.

October usually means one thing around Dauphin Way: PUMPKINS. This year, we were buried in orange round things, but we piled other stuff on top, too! Every year, I am in awe of the footprint of our pumpkin patch on Mobile. Everyone knows about our great pumpkin patch, which is a beautiful witness to what our church means to this community. We took advantage of the theme with some fun events! The Youth Ministry pulled off the annual Market at the Patch on a beautiful Saturday. Our Children's Ministry combined

Trunk or Treat with CDC's Fall Festival, which saw hundreds of participants. We also hosted dozens of field trips and groups, including non-profits like Dumas Wesley, First Light, and Callahan School for the Deaf and Blind. Our pumpkin patch may be a smelly burden, but it is a source of joy to so many.

We also hosted the Dill Lecture featuring Paul Chilcote on October 20. Both of his presentations were right up my alley as he touched on Wesleyan theology, evangelism, and spiritual formation. It was an honor and joy to spend time with one of the foremost scholars in United Methodism.

Speaking of spiritual formation, October was a fantastic month for that with kids, youth, and adults. I launched my Bible study on The Book of James titled "Walking the Walk," and we have had great attendance in that with representation from all 3 of our early fall groups and classes. I am excited to continue the conversation on living out our faith on November 17 and 24 at 4:30, and we would love for you to join us.

Many people have asked me what our church is doing for Hurricane Helene Relief. First, we have supported UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) financially. Dauphin Way members give generously to this organization because they do a great job and every dollar donated goes straight to the need. Second, we have assembled and sent 20 more "flood buckets" with cleaning supplies for UMCOR teams to use for relief. Third, we have connected with a church in North Carolina that is going to shop for toys for kids in the affected areas who would go without

presents at Christmas this year without some help. Fourth, we have grown our Early Response Team pool so that we can respond with action when we are called upon.

A few weeks ago, I received a call from someone who from Norton Lilly, a shipping company downtown. Their company wanted to do a supply drive, but did not have a way to transport the items. They called our church and asked if we would get the items to where they were needed, and I said, "Yes!" The person had no connection to our church; she simply knew that Dauphin Way was a church that does good things for people, and I think that is something worth celebrating. We are known by our love for others.

If you are looking to find your place in doing good for others, please let me know! There is so much need all around us, and you may be just the person equipped to meet it. I would love to have that conversation with you... although it may have to wait until after November 17. I will be taking the first couple weeks off to spend with my family as we welcome our third child! Olivia and I are grateful for the opportunity to have this time together and to raise our children in such a loving church. "Praise God from whom all blessings flow!"

LEADERSHIP @ DAUPHIN WAY

CHURCH COUNCIL

- Generally meets on the fourth Monday of the month.
- Anyone may attend a Church Council meeting.
- Voting members include the pastors, 12 officers, and 9-12 at-large members.

SPRC

The Staff-Parish Relations Committee generally meets in the second week of the month. Because the SPR deals with sensitive, employment-related issues, their meetings are usually open only to members. However, the SPRC chair may invite non-members to attend a particular meeting.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Generally meets in the second week of the month. The Board of Trustees is the only committee that elects its own chair. Anyone may attend a Trustees' meeting.

FINANCE

Generally meets in the third week of the month.

13 voting members include Chair, Treasurer, Financial Secretary, Lay Leader, SPRC Chair, and Trustees Chair. Anyone may attend a Finance meeting.

NOMINATIONS

The Nominations Committee meets three times in August and September to prayerfully consider who to nominate as officers and committee members for Dauphin Way's leadership. The committee seeks input from all volunteer teams and also considers which members have been actively living their commitments to prayer, presence, gifts, service, and witness. Because these meetings deal with individual members of the congregation, they are strictly confidential.

TRUSTEES

The capital fund balance as of 9/30/2024 is \$285,161.53 (the capital maintenance fund increased by approximately \$40,000 this month as a result of auditor adjustments). This number is expected to be reduced to \$229,427.48 as we finish all of the projects that have been approved and are ongoing.

Security camera installation is nearly complete. In an effort to further protect the CDC, we have decided to move the CDC entrance to the Breezeway. Using a separate entrance means the CDC door will always be locked (with access limited to CDC staff/families/guests) while the church can keep the doors to the Gathering Place open to the community. We also voted to move the wooden doors in the Breezeway to the other side of the bathroom. The upside of this for the church is that it will make the nice bathrooms in the CDC hallway accessible during church events (funerals, etc.).

To reduce our phone costs, we are going to transition from C Spire to Microsoft Teams.

Work to clean up mildew in the chapel is nearly complete, as is work to fix some termite damage around the chapel door and Breezeway window (there are no active termites in either location).

The trustees have now received HVAC bids from Donaghey and Grayson (in addition to the bid previously submitted by Power of Clean Energy (PCE)). Donaghey's bid in the amount of \$987,000 is to change out the existing chillers and cooling towers with the same thing we have now. This will not solve our ongoing humidity problem nor will it offer any energy savings moving forward. Grayson's bid in the amount of \$53,000 is to clean all of the air-handling units and coils. They said that was the best they could do (they are too small a company to take on the job of replacing our entire HVAC system). Cindy has now spoken to a few of the places (churches in Tennessee and Georgia) PCE has done work to get their opinion on PCE. Both had only good things to say. They reported that PCE did exactly what they said they would do, with minimal disruptions to their operations, and that they

were now seeing the energy savings PCE promised they would see. In light of the good reports we got from previous PCE clients, the projected energy savings with the new VRF system, and the fact that PCE's system will solve our ongoing humidity issues, the trustees think we should go with PCE's bid instead of the bids submitted by Donaghey and Grayson.

SPRC

SPRC met on October 17, 2024. The areas of focus for the past month or so has been on the search for our new Director of Music, beginning the process of filling Katharine Loeffler's role and supporting the staff in various ways. This week members of SPRC who are serving on the search committee for the Director of Music position, completed in person interviews with the four candidates who were chosen from the first round of interviews. In the coming weeks, we hope to announce a new Director of Music. We also continue to celebrate the birthdays of our Dauphin Way employees and plans are in place for the staff Christmas party.

FINANCE

The Finance Committee met on Tuesday, October 15 and reviewed the September financial statements. The month ended with a gain of \$15,513.05, reducing our year-to-date deficit to \$168,363.30. The CDC ended the month with a deficit of \$6,336.12, and a year-to-date deficit of \$4,775.95. We received the Employee Retention Credit (ERC) for the CDC. The credit totaled \$20,444.50 plus \$5,020.52 in interest. The church has yet to receive the ERC is applied for.

The committee received copies of the completed audits for the church and the CDC. No surprises were noted. The adjusting entries impacted two designated accounts positively.

The Stewardship Committee reported that the campaign was going well. The question and answer sessions were successful. Commitment Sunday is October 27. Committees are already being established to conduct follow-up after the conclusion of the campaign. Once the campaign is concluded, the Finance committee will be working diligently to create a balanced budget for 2025.
