


PASTORAL REPORTS

ave you ever dreamed of walking where Jesus walked, of seeing the kind of places where Abraham pitched his tent or where ancient Israelites shared meals together? While we may not all be ready to board a plane to the Holy Land, I have the next best thing— and it's just a short road trip away!

On Thursday, **November 6**, we're heading to The Biblical History Center in LaGrange, Georgia—a living museum that brings the ancient world to life with a special focus on daily life in ancient Israel. This is not your typical museum experience. It's hands-on, immersive, and deeply meaningful.



Here are just a few of the highlights:

- Step inside a goat-hair tent like those used by nomadic shepherds for thousands of years.
- Visit tombs similar to those that might have held Abraham or Jesus.
- Wander through a reconstructed village and city gate to experience what daily life looked like 2,000 years ago.
- Share a Passover-style meal, much like what Jesus and the disciples would have eaten at the Last Supper.

I've taken groups here before, and each time it has felt like stepping into the pages of Scripture. There's something about seeing and touching these spaces— about tasting the kind of food Jesus would have eaten—that brings the Bible to life in a whole new way.

We'll travel together by charter bus, leaving from Dauphin Way at 8 AM and returning around 8 PM. The cost of the trip is \$160, which includes transportation, the guided tour, and lunch. And if you register by **August 10** using the code 'Early Bird', you'll receive \$20 off.

I'll be on the trip, and I would love for you to come with us. There's nothing quite like a church road trip to deepen friendships, make new memories, and grow in faith together. I hope you'll consider joining me for this meaningful adventure.

- "I don't want to commit without knowing the time commitment of the role."





As we gathered with family and friends to celebrate the birthday of the United States, we gave thanks for the freedoms we enjoy and for the country we call home. These moments of celebration also called us to deeper reflection— recognizing that while we are grateful for our liberty, we are mindful of the many in our world who do not live in such freedom.

This month has been a time to remember those who suffer under oppression, those impacted by war, and families who have lost loved ones. We are called to be people of prayer and action—



lifting up those in grief and listening for the ways God may be directing us to reach out in love and compassion.

Our hearts have especially been with those communities in our own country devastated by tragic flooding this July. The loss of life, including children and adults, has been heartbreaking. As a church family, we hold those families in prayer, trusting in God's comfort and presence even in the most difficult of times.

Our Prayer Shawl Ministry made a number of shawls for the ladies graduating from the Home of Grace. The Home of Grace for Women in Eight Mile, Alabama, is a residential alcohol and drug recovery program for women aged 18 and up. The Home of Grace is a long-standing option for women seeking recovery in Alabama. Dauphin Way worked with this ministry in the past when we offered Celebrate Recovery. This group of ladies have also worshiped with us in our contemporary service. Our Prayer Shawl group now provides and prays over each shawl for every graduate.

Here at Dauphin Way, our support group ministries continue to be a lifeline for many— not only within our own congregation but for members of the wider community. Our various support groups have been meeting regularly, addressing the specific needs of each group while also anchoring each gathering in devotional time. This month, our shared focus was on the quiet, powerful reality of God's miracles— those we see and those we wait for with faith.

We found special encouragement in the words of Isaiah 55:8:

"My thoughts are not like your thoughts," says the Lord, "and my ways are far beyond anything you could imagine."

This verse reminds us that God is always working, even in unseen and mysterious ways, and that His purposes often unfold beyond our understanding.


As we move into the rest of the summer, may we remain faithful in thanksgiving, steady in prayer, and open to the call of love.





CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

uly is a month of planning and preparation for the Children's Ministry, as well as a time to refresh and regroup after a busy, joyful June.

We are adding a hallway bulletin board and Bible banners to our three teaching classrooms upstairs. In addition, the Trustees have approved our request to paint murals in two of these rooms. My team and I have refurbished, reorganized, and are restructuring curriculum and supplies in all three teaching areas for our 4K-5th grade students in anticipation of our late summer/fall programming. An amazing group of men met early one Saturday this month to build a GAGA pit on our playground—it is going to be a BLAST to add this to our



Sunday evening recreation roster. They worked so hard and during Mobile's sweatiest season to have this ready for the children of this church.

In addition to caring for precious infants and toddlers in the nursery, some of our nursery staff will be presenting Bible lessons and stories, games, and crafts during our Sunday morning programming, and we're inviting our 3 and 4-year-olds to join Ms. Heather and Ms. Susan in The Treehouse during the Contemporary and Traditional service times to take part in this sweet time together. All children older than 4 will sit with their parents during the services through July (activity pages, children's bulletins, and crayon packs are available in McGowin, the Gathering Place, and in the Narthex), and we will begin again with morning Children's Church on **August 3**. Parents are asked to pick their children up after the services conclude in Room 215; if children arrive late for Children's Church, we ask that their parents accompany them upstairs to ensure a safe arrival to our classroom area.

How can you serve in ministry this year? This is a question that the church staff hopes members will consider as they look ahead to the late summer and into the new school year. Lots of additions to our curriculum and schedule means that we can offer more streamlined, age-specific teaching, games, crafts, skits, and play across the elementary school grades, and I'd love to recruit helpers to make this possible and successful. We have some exciting opportunities for service in both morning and evening Children's Ministry. I'm also including a sign-up for fourth and fifth graders to assist during children's church services (1 student per service, weekly) with my volunteer sign-up link.



Wilson Newell and I have been looking at our Third Grade Bible curriculum, updating our Children's Ministry portion of the church's website, and recreating forms we'll use for parent recruitment and kids' registration at our August meeting. Rev. Gillian Walters is building a timeline for me to use and to promote to help our parents understand when certain core tenets of the Methodist theology will be emphasized during the 4K-fifth grade programming, and we will include this during our 4-year-old Worship Bag presentation in August. In addition, I'll be working with the Children's Ministry team at Spanish Fort UMC to construct activities for the Family Camp weekend; my hope is conveying to our church that families look very different, and that we are all part of a family, no matter how it's constructed.

It's a blessing to be part of this staff and congregation. I am grateful as always for the support and love that this Ministry receives.

le have finally had a chance to catch our breath and get some rest. As many of you know, at the end of June, a team of 16 youths and adults went to Añasco, Puerto Rico to serve with the organization Puerto Rico Somos Gente. After a late arrival on Saturday, we spent Sunday morning in worship with the help of a translator. Lunch was a picnic in a beachside park followed by a prayer walk around the park. On the way home, we made a stop at Wal-Mart to pick up forgotten items, extra VBS supplies, and snacks. The rest of Sunday was spent resting and preparing for the week ahead. Our workdays were very similar through the week. In the mornings, 10 of us put on VBS for ~30 kids from the community, doing crafts, the Bible lesson, games, snack, lunch, and just



general play. The other 6 of us worked on a couple of different projects including cleaning the home of an elderly gentleman, cleaning out a supply closet, and mixing and pouring concrete. In the afternoons, the 10 from VBS would join in those projects as well as clean around the organization and power wash.

We also went on a couple of excursions throughout the week. On Tuesday evening, we went to a prayer service at a nearby church where a few of our girls played instruments during worship. Following the service, we went to a local dessert place and got ice cream. On Wednesday, we were able to go to the



beach and enjoy the sand and water before attempting to catch the sunset. Unfortunately, the clouds had other plans. And then on Thursday, we got to spend a little bit of time in a wave pool before going to the only bioluminescent bay that you are able to swim in. With this excursion we were taken out by boat to an island and swam in the water until the sun went down. From there we went into the bay where we got to swim around for about 30 minutes before heading back in.

The real fun didn't begin though until Friday night in Atlanta when Hartsfield Jackson was blessed with hail. After 4 1-hour delays, a cancellation, a long walk from terminal F to baggage claim, false hope over 4 rental cars, acceptance at spending the night on the floor, an angel

at Avis in downtown Atlanta, Waffle House, Wal-Mart, another angel with a bus, and wonderful parents, we made it back to Mobile with most of our luggage. In summation, your run-of-the-mill mission trip.

CHURCH COUNCIL

- Generally meets on the fourth Monday of the month.

- Voting members include the pastors, 12 officers, and 9-12 at-large members.

SPRC

The Staff-Parish Relations Committee generally meets in the second week of the month. Because the SPR deals with sensitive, employment-related issues, their meetings are usually open only to members. However, the SPRC chair may invite non-members to attend a particular meeting.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The church ended June with a gain of **\$48,613.44**. This decreased our YTD deficit to **\$142,107.11**.

The capital maintenance fund balance as of 6/30/2025 is \$268,307.63. We received \$500 for this account in June. We spent \$1,468.41 on additional licenses for the security cameras, \$4,789.79 on lettering to repair the Dauphin Way UMC sign, and \$697.22 on chapel repairs.

The Trustees approved a motion from Heather White to paint murals in two of the classrooms upstairs to revitalize that area. The project will have minimal costs and enhance the learning space.
