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PASTORAL REPORTS

Jacob's ladder comes from a story in Genesis, when Jacob is on the run from his brother Esau. Alone and uncertain, he lies down in the middle of nowhere, using a stone for a pillow. As he sleeps, he dreams of a ladder reaching from earth to heaven, with angels ascending and descending. It is a reminder that God's grace meets us not only in holy places, but also in the wilderness—when we are tired, unsure, and least expecting it.

Jacob's Ladder is also the name of a group here at our church. It's our volunteer team that helps fix, repair, and care for our campus. And the name fits beautifully. Jacob's ladder is the place where heaven meets real, dusty ground—and that is exactly the work this team does. They take the church's mission and make it tangible. Because of them, lights work, doors open, classrooms are safe, and worship can happen. Their labor allows the holy and the ordinary to meet.

A ladder exists to help someone reach what they couldn't reach alone. In that way, this team supports the entire congregation—children, choir, clergy, guests—so that each of us can live into our calling. Their service quite literally lifts others up.

In fact, they lifted me up when I first arrived. Though I had not yet met many of them in person, it quickly became clear that I am shorter than all of my predecessors. On my very first Sunday, I stood on a box to preach from the pulpit. After nearly falling out of the pulpit, the Jacob's Ladder team went to work. They raised the bottom of the pulpit so that I wouldn't need a box each week. I didn't ask them, they just heard about what happened and went to work. It meant the world to me. I received it as a sign that I didn't need to be someone I'm not. I'm not tall and never will be! But there was a place for me as I am. It was a beautiful act of hospitality and welcome.

More recently, you may have noticed the wood rot repairs around the chapel and Gathering Place windows, often covered by blue tarps between workdays. These talented gentlemen have used their skills and expertise to carefully design and fit each piece so it matches the original work. Their generosity of time and talent has saved the church over \$35,000 that we would have otherwise spent on contractors.

And just recently, Darrin mentioned to Tim a small thing that makes a big difference: the way the sanctuary doors open creates traffic flow problems during funerals and special services. That very day, they were measuring and exploring how to reverse the doors to better serve the congregation.



These are the kinds of acts that turn ordinary spaces into places where angels can descend and where we can encounter the holy in our everyday lives.

Today, I give thanks for our Jacob's Ladder lay and staff crew: Robert Hunter, Tim Collier, Larry Hitson, Irvin Rentz, Mike Nichols, Mike Stringer, and Mike Thompson. Glory be to God for the way they share their gifts and make space for heaven and earth to meet.

2025 Highlights

As I look back on 2025, I can see God's hand all over it. 2025 was truly the most fun and fruitful year of ministry I have ever experienced. My ordination in June was a special moment for me, but I can point to countless others, too. When our SPRC hired Darrin, Natalie, Kassidy, and Heather White early in the year, it felt like the Holy Spirit brought a renewed spirit of unity and mission to our staff and our whole church.

We saw this in action during the season of Lent. Our sermon series, music, and adult studies were all built around the Final Words from the Cross. We had over 40 people participate in those groups, and our conversation was rich and Gospel-centered. We heard inspiring messages from bishops and other leaders in our denomination during the Lenten dinners. We capped off Lent with an incredible Holy Week featuring a huge Palm Sunday service and Fish Fry and beautiful, meaningful Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services. It made Easter that much more joyful. The whole Easter season was celebratory and bright, as we served together for LOVEMOB Sunday, confirmed 19 students into the life of our church, and celebrated our seniors, babies, and mothers.

I witnessed this collaboration this summer with VBS, too. Heather White and volunteers pulled together an incredibly Christ-centered VBS for 180 kids in just 6 weeks, and our whole team jumped in to support. I especially had a lot of fun being "Paul, y'all!" and witnessing the 5th graders serving others in the community.

When fall arrived, I knew that God was going to do some great things in our children and youth. The new schedule allowed for cohesion between the different ages, and it paved the way for them to reach new heights. For children's ministry, 60 was the max number of kids last year. This year, 60 was the minimum. Several evenings, there were over 90 of them!!! That's a lot of kids. And every one of them got to sing, play, and hear the word of God proclaimed. We witnessed the culmination of this work in December with 91 kids at Jesus' birthday party, 55 in White Christmas, and over 60 in the Christmas pageant.

Our youth director, Andrew Peeler, also deserves a lot of credit for his leadership of the youth ministry. Our congregation got a glimpse of the passing on of the faith that has been happening through Dauphin Way Student Ministries for decades: volunteers pouring into leaders who then pour into others. Their retreats and trips offer particularly special milestone events for students to encounter God.



Another key player for the youth ministry has been Chris Nodine, who stepped up to lead the youth band this year in addition to his other roles as Tech Specialist and drummer for the Contemporary Service. He has been an invaluable asset to our church.

Our adult groups and classes also had a banner year, with over 80 different individuals participating in all the studies offered. I give thanks for our gifted leaders, Rev. Kathy Jorgensen, Rev. Bruce Fitzgerald, Kim Daniels, Suzanne Crawley, and Louise McCown. It was a joy for me to lead the Lent Study, Practicing the Way, and Messiah Advent Study. If you have not participated in a group or class with one of these people, you are missing out!

In December, we celebrated the retirement of Marsha McGehee and welcomed Emily Walker to our staff as our Director of Hospitality and Food Services. She has hit the ground running and has some incredible ideas to go with her energy and knowledge.

What an incredible year. God is so good.

But we can't rest on our laurels... God is calling us to some big things as a church this year.

As we head into a new year, I have a few high hopes for adult discipleship and missions.

1. To reconstruct the Missions Team

This team would provide vision for our outreach ministries and their funding

2. To identify a new International Missions Partner

God is at work all over the world, and going abroad to witness God's kingdom in another context and among other people is a profound gift.

3. To strengthen and add new Supper Clubs, Sunday Schools, and Small Groups.

Lynn Davidson will be our supper club coordinator, and if you are looking for a group from the church to gather with for a monthly meal, reach out to us!

4. To grow Meals on Wheels

We need a volunteer PR coordinator for this ministry to get the word out to our community about this great ministry.

The truth is that I have no chance of accomplishing any of those on my own. It will take the Body of Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit to see these become reality. If you read any of those goals and felt the Holy Spirit prick your heart, maybe God is calling you to participate? I would love to tell you more about these things!

The Children's Ministry wrapped up evening programming on Sunday, December 7 with a Birthday Party for Baby Jesus during our dinner together. We had over 90 children participate, along with many volunteers who came to serve dinner and dessert, and to teach or lead kids in various rotations during the evening. Our icing and cupcakes were homemade by two church members, Carol Jordan and Negin Ahmadi-Miller, and the kids got to decorate their own dessert and sing "Happy Birthday" to Jesus. It was also exciting to hear the 67 kids in two of the three children's choirs sing "Messiah" in the Sanctuary in preparation for White Christmas, and to then listen to kids on the playground humming or singing lyrics to Handel's masterpiece while they climbed on the jungle gym and ran around in the dark with their friends.



We will have two practices for the Children's Christmas Pageant, and the choir is generously treating the kids to a short reception in the Music Suite following the pageant. Children of all ages have been encouraged to participate, and it's going to be a sweet, family-friendly service at 10:30 AM on **December 24**. I am especially grateful to Karen Ann Beville and Martha Cook, who have helped get all of our costumes sorted and laundered in preparation for the Pageant. We are looking at a cast of, if not thousands, at least sixty kids participating in roles from the Holy Family to choirs of angels, bands of shepherds, visiting Wise Men, and every kind of animal that can be found in a barnyard.

I am encouraging parents whose children stay in the nursery, sturdy walkers to twos, and three/four-year-old classes to send notes of thanks and Christmas cards to our incredible, dedicated nursery staff during the holidays.

CONTEMPORARY WORSHIP

As we enter a new year together, I am deeply grateful for the way the Advent season unfolded in our worship spaces. Advent went beautifully, and it was especially meaningful to weave the theme of our White Christmas celebration, drawing from Handel's Messiah, into the season. The music and scripture together created space for reflection, longing, and wonder, grounding us in the promise of Christ's coming while inviting the congregation to engage both heart and mind.

It was such a gift to be able to coordinate and plan our special worship services this year with Rev. Darrin Scott Isaac, particularly the Christmas Eve services. By mirroring the contemporary and traditional services, we were able to offer a shared worship experience across styles. No matter which service people attended, they encountered the Christmas story through scripture and song in a similar way—singing familiar hymns woven between readings that told the story of Christ's birth. This continuity felt especially important on such a holy night, emphasizing our unity as one church gathered to celebrate one Savior.

Christmas Eve was marked by a powerful sense of reverence and joy, particularly in the candlelight following communion. Singing Silent Night together, surrounded by the glow of candlelight, was a sacred moment that beautifully captured the peace and mystery of the incarnation. It was a reminder that Christ meets us in both stillness and song, at the table and in the light we carry into the world.

As we turn our hearts toward a new year, there is a palpable sense of excitement about what lies ahead. Because these meetings deal with individual members of the congregation, they are strictly confidential.


